

Tutorial 3 transcript – Reading Lists

Okay, so we're going to have a look briefly now at locating a Unit Reading List and also accessing the materials within it. So we're looking at the UTAS library homepage here. We're going to go up to the top right-hand corner and click on the Reading Lists link.

So on the left-hand side of the page here, what we're looking at is you can browse for Reading Lists, and they're arranged alphabetically by unit code. Or we can search for our Reading List. So we can do that via the unit code, we can do that via the unit name, or we can do that via the lecturer or the teacher. In this case, I'm going to search via the unit code. Now the unit that I'm enrolled in is HTC one-zero-one; this is Ancient civilisations. So I just type the code in there and click on search.

Back to the left-hand side of the page, and it comes up with the unit that I am enrolled in; click on that. Come back down to the bottom right-hand corner of the page, and we're going to click on view list.

So what we are presented with now are a couple of headings. The first is texts. So here we've got a list of texts for this unit, and these are hyperlinked to the library catalogue. So, for example, if I choose the sixth text here – Images of women and antiquity – I click on that it's going to take me to the library catalogue and tell me where I can find that book. So we can see there we've got a call number, and I'll talk a little bit more about that in another module.

Just returning to the Reading Lists now, the next tab along for the texts list is the readings. Now the readings: these tend to be either journal articles, or chapters from books that have been requested by your lecturer to be scanned and placed online. So you can see the second one there: that is a journal article from the journal Greece and Rome. So if I click on that I'll be taken to a scanned PDF of that particular article. Or if we look at the fifth ... the fifth item there we see that it's chapter 20 from the book in Oxford readings in Greek tragedy. So these can all be accessed and viewed online.

And the third tab there across from Readings is Exam papers. And you can see you have a look at some past exam papers there in preparation for your own. And that's Reading Lists.
