Unit Description:	Students are required to read original German texts and to provide written synopses of them. The unit concentrates also on translation from and to German.
Unit Aims and Objectives:	The aims of this unit are to enable students to: 1. develop the skills of close reading literature, critical thinking and textual analysis; 2. develop knowledge of specific historical issues and their cultural meanings within the German context.
Learning Outcomes:	Students taking this unit will: 1. build <i>knowledge</i> in the areas described in the Units Aims and Objectives (above); 2. enhance skills in a) written <i>communication</i> , b) research techniques.
Required Texts:	Texts on a topic agreed on between the individual student and a supervisor
Recommended Texts:	N/A

When Taught:	Fortnightly meetings at a time agreed on between the individual student and a supervisor.
Assessment:	Fortnightly reports in German of 100 words each (40%), 3-hr exam (60%).
