Year 4 & 5 Medical Students Placement Advice For Practice Managers Thank you for being involved with the Rural Clinical School (RCS) Primary Care Programme (PCP) in 2020, which is part of the Year 4 MBBS Undergraduate Rural Clinical Programme at the University of Tasmania, College of Health & Medicine. The MBBS is a 5 year course. Year 4 is the first clinical year and Year 5 is the final year.

Practice Managers play a vital role in the success of our student's placement.

How practices manage the students will vary according to their teaching resources and style.

I have drawn up some guidance for practice managers on how to enhance the student experience and minimise the impact on the practice.

Our year 4 students will be in practice every Tuesday commencing from **Tuesday 17**<sup>th</sup> **March** concluding on Tuesday the **20**<sup>th</sup> **October 2020**.

# General Practice experience at University of Tasmania

The first three years are spent in Hobart and the clinical years are spent in Burnie, Launceston or Hobart.

#### Year 1-3 visits to General Practice-based in Hobart

## Year 1 and 2

Students in years 1 and 2 attend practices for a few hours or a day. These visits are an introduction to General Practice and to meet members of the Primary Health Care Team. The students are undertaking a variety of other community based activities to introduce them to the North West Coast and the Burnie campus. In Year 1, students spend 1 week on NW coast. During that time they are involved in the team building activities, various clinical scenarios and visits to the Rural Clinical School and other places in the NW coast. In year 2, along with attending General Practices, they stay in the community, that gives them opportunity to enhance their understanding of living in a rural community.

#### Year 3

Third year students spend two weeks in General Practice. This allows students their first clinical experience in General Practice and many students use this opportunity to see if they would like to transfer to the RCS campus for their clinical years. These students have a workbook that needs to be completed and concentrates on basic clinical skills and diabetes management (work up a case on diabetes during this visit).

#### Year 4

As part of their clinical rotation in Fourth year students spend 1 day a week for a whole year in General Practice. These students are based at the Burnie Campus and undertake clinical rotations at Mersey Hospital Latrobe and North West Regional Hospital Burnie for the rest of the week.

## Year 5

As part of their clinical rotation in Final year students spend four weeks in rural and remote practices like Rosebery, King Island & Queenstown.

# **Preparation for Students**

- 1) Induction students should have the same induction as any new staff.
- 2) Students will need familiarisation with the computer- Appendix 1.
- 3) Timetabling Practices will have either 1, 2, 3 or 4 students. Each student will have one consulting session and one non consulting session.
- 4) Students should be given a copy of their timetable an example of this is included in Appendix 3.
- 5) Most practices use Wave Consulting. This requires students to see patients independently and then present to their supervisor GP. To do this effectively patients need to be scheduled for the student and students have their own password access to the computer. Receptionists need to be trained to offer and to explain to patients about the medical student appointments. See Appendix 2.

  Ideally at least one patient could be booked in with the condition of the CBL topic see Appendix 5.

#### What should the non consulting student do?

The non consulting student can be called in to see / work with any of the other members of the practice team if they have something they feel would be of interest to the student

Students can undertake a wide range of activities in this time developing procedural skills, interprofessional education, community liaison, audit and self directed study. A list of skills and non consulting activities is included in Appendix 4.

#### **Team Work**

- Working with receptionists to develop an understanding of how practice works and how patients present to non clinical staff. See Appendix 2.
- Working with the practice nurse and other members of the team. Activities could include blood taking, immunisation clinics, dressings, developing GP management plans, practical skills INR testing, BSL, spirometry, health checks etc.
- Shadowing any other allied health professionals that attend the practice

## Skills

There should be a particular focus on skill development so students often spend this time with the nurse undertaking practical procedures.

# **Interprofessional Education**

Allied Health - Interprofessional learning is vital for our medical student's education. Each practice and area offers a wide variety of learning opportunities.

Mandatory sessions should be undertaken with the community nurses, child health and pharmacy.

Other sessions can be negotiated with yourself according to local opportunities and the students learning needs. If you have problems arranging these please contact Karen Lowe on 6430 1603.

# **Community Liaison**

General Practitioners play an important role in their communities. We would like the students to experience some aspects of this wider role. Activities such as working with school groups and voluntary organisations are important learning experiences. We would like medical students to participate in teaching or patient education in the community. If the practice has links that would facilitate, this could be undertaken on a Tuesday. If there are difficulties arranging this then we can arrange this.

# Other learning tasks

- · Visit nursing homes or undertake home visits with other GP's,
- Attend home medication reviews,
- Follow up their long cases,
- Research on the conditions or medications they see in consultations.
- Attend placements where student has identified a need.
- Audit

#### **Allied Health Attachments**

Patients receive care and are able to function in the community as a result of many different allied health professionals and volunteers. It is important that our medical students are aware of who works in the community, what they do for patients and how they relate to General Practice. Interdisciplinary learning is a core part of our curriculum.

At a minimum all students should have at least one session with the

- · community nurse,
- child health nurse
- pharmacist

Ideally students should be able to spend sessions with as many allied health professionals and volunteer organisations as possible.

A list of possible attachments is drawn up.

It is for the student to negotiate with the practice the best time for these attachments and the type of attachments that are available in the area. If there are any problems arranging these please contact Karen Lowe on 03 6430 1668.

# **Appendix 1 - Virtual Surgery for Computer Familiarisation**

Use the practice 'phantom patient'

- Enter significant PMH eg IHD, allergies eg to penicillin, family history of diabetes
- Write in today's notes
- For the common conditions listed below develop short cuts
- (Set up your computer so you can have investigation strings and common templates in your favourites).
- Develop 'blood investigation strings' for diabetes, hypertension, fatigue.
- Know at least one drug for treating conditions for prescribers, print out prescription
- Identify skills you may need to manage these conditions.
- Identify patient information leaflets you may need.
- Write a referral letter.
- Write a certificate.
- Write a Centrelink certificate.
- Write a worker's compensation certificate.
- Fill in a CDM template for the chronic conditions below
- Fill in a GP Mental Health Plan.

# Appendix 2 - Practice Reception Staff Briefing

# **Medical students in Primary Care**

The University of Tasmania train medical students across the state.

The first three years are spent in Hobart and the clinical years are spent in Burnie, Launceston or Hobart.

The North West Coast gets short visits from year 1 and 2 students who often attend practices for a few hours or one day.

- Third year students spend up to two weeks in general practice.
- Fourth year students spend 1 day a week for a whole year in general practice.
- Final year students spend five weeks in rural and remote practices.

Students learn best when they are actively involved in patient care and feel part of the team.

Receptionists are a vital part of the practice team. It is important for medical students to spend some time in reception to understand some of the administrative aspects of practice.

In reception students will learn:

- How appointments are booked
- How patients are billed
- How paperwork is handled: ie letters, certificates etc
- How staff deal with difficult situations

## Appointments when there are medical students

When your practice has medical students often the GP's will want appointments set up in a particular way. This is to enhance the learning experience for the students. Supervising GP's often find it difficult to accept extras so it is helpful to mark the appointments schedule accordingly.

# Informing patients about medical students

Training medical students is an integral part of general practice and developing our future doctors. Most patients are happy to see a medical student first or with their GP but some would prefer to see the GP alone. It is important that patients are advised when they book the consultation if they will be seeing a medical student.

Receptionists will need to check with the patients again when they book in to check that patients consent to a medical student being present at consultation.

# **Practice sign**

The Rural Clinical School has certificates and notices for reception, informing patients that the practice is a certified teaching practice and that medical students are in attendance.
