

Ceremonial and Academic Dress Procedure



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Purpose

This procedure prescribes the ceremonial and academic dress worn at the University of Tasmania.

Procedure

1 General Information

The University encourages the use of ceremonial and academic dress on formal occasions, however, wearing regalia is not compulsory.

The colours of stoles/hoods relevant to specific degrees and disciplines are outlined in Schedules 1 and 2. Typically, one colour is assigned to each College, apart from legacy colours that have been assigned to Faculty, Schools or Disciplines in prior years.

An Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander person is entitled to wear a scarf defined in Schedule 3, in addition to the appropriate academic dress specified in Section 3, as a sign of the University's acknowledgement of the traditional owners of the land on which we live and work, and our recognition of their enduring culture.

Proposals outlining the case for the addition of new colours, or changes to the colours listed in Schedules 1 and 2, are brought to the Ceremonial and Honorary Degrees Committee (CHDC) for endorsement to proceed to the University Council for consideration and approval.

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Donations of academic dress may be accepted into:

- the University's academic dress supply - if the donated material is assessed as appropriate to enhance or supplement the University's collection for staff use during graduation ceremonies; or
- the University Library's Special & Rare Collections - if assessed as being of sufficient significance, rarity, or relevance to the University.

Donated items that are not in keeping with the University's Special and Rare Collections Collection Policy, duplicate to the collections, in poor condition, or otherwise not required, may be discarded or passed on to another institution without notification to the donor, or returned to the donor at the donor's expense.

2 Ceremonial Dress

Ceremonial dress may be worn by members of University Council and senior University officers when attending any of the following occasions:

- ceremonies for the conferral of degrees and awarding of diplomas at the University
- any formal occasion of the University for which the University specifies academic dress
- ceremonies of other institutions at which the wearing of ceremonial address is appropriate or requested.

Australian Maritime College Chairperson	A black gown with gold trim, and 9 gold bands	A black trencher cap with gold trim and gold tassel

Principal of the Australian Maritime College	A black gown with gold trim and 5 gold bands	A black trencher cap with gold trim and gold tassel

Undergraduates and holders of associate diplomas	A gown of black cloth, of the same shape as that worn by Bachelors of Arts in the University of Oxford		A black cloth trencher cap with black tassel
Associates or holders of diplomas not being graduates	A gown of black cloth, of the same shape as that worn by Bachelors of Arts in the University of Oxford	A stole of silk 10 centimetres wide, tapering to 4.5 centimetres across the shoulders, and of the length of the gown on each side. The colour of the stole shall be as determined for the relevant College/discipline in Schedule 1.	A black cloth trencher cap with black tassel
Bachelors	A gown of black cloth, of the same shape as that worn by Bachelors of Arts in the University of Oxford	A hood of black cloth of the same shape and size as that worn by Bachelors of Arts in the University of Oxford, lined to a depth of 5 centimetres with coloured silk in the tippet and cowl. For AMC graduates the hood is lined entirely with silk and edged with wine coloured braid. The silk is to be the relevant colour specified in Schedule 1 or Schedule 2.	A black cloth trencher cap with black tassel
Holders of diplomas being graduates	The academic dress pertaining to the degree held by the diplomate before admission to the course for the diploma.		

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Masters other than Master of Surgery	A gown of black cloth, of the same shape as that worn by Masters of Arts in the University of Oxford	A hood of black cloth of the same shape and size as that worn by Masters of Arts in the University of Oxford, lined entirely with silk. For AMC graduates the hood is lined entirely with silk and edged with gold coloured braid. The colour of the silk lining shall be as determined for that degree in Schedule 1.	A black cloth trencher cap with black tassel
Professional doctorates	A festal gown of black cloth, fully lined in the sleeves and faced on the full length of the lapels to a width of 10 centimetres with coloured silk	A hood of coloured cloth of the same shape and size as that worn by Masters of Arts in the University of Oxford, lined with coloured silk. The colour of the silk, cord and tassel and hood is the relevant colour specified in Schedule 1.	A black velvet bonnet trimmed with a coloured cord and tassel
Doctors of philosophy	A festal gown of black cloth, fully lined in the sleeves and faced on the full length of the lapels to a width of 10 centimetres with scarlet silk	A hood of scarlet cloth of the same shape and size as that worn by Masters of Arts in the University of Oxford, lined with scarlet silk	A black velvet bonnet trimmed with scarlet cord and tassel
Doctors (other than doctors of philosophy and professional doctorates) and Masters of Surgery	A festal gown of scarlet cloth, faced on the full length of the lapels to a width of 10 centimetres with coloured silk, with open pointed sleeves fully lined with coloured silk and turned back above the elbow	A black cloth hood of the same size and shape as that of a Doctor in the University of Cambridge, lined entirely with coloured silk. The colour of the silk is as specified in Schedule 1 for the College/discipline in which the degree was obtained.	A black velvet bonnet trimmed with gold cord and tassel

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Schedule 1 – Colours for Awards

The colours described in Schedules 1 and 2 are defined by comparison with the Australian Colour Standard and any other widely accepted colour standard that the Manager, Events and Protocol decides is appropriate.

The Manager, Events and Protocol will hold swatches of material in the defined colours and will maintain a list showing the definition of each colour by reference to those colour standards.

Academic dress for students graduating with double degrees will be prescribed in due course.

For students currently enrolled in the following combined degrees (including degrees awarded with honours), the silk lining of the hood comprises two parallel and adjoining bands, each 2.5cm wide, in the colours described in the table. The colour listed first is on the outside of the hood.
