Using special funding from the Chief Operating Officer, Commercial Services & Development recently upgraded 740 downlights at both Sandy Bay and Newnham campuses from old style 12V halogen to longer lasting and more energy efficient LED technology - delivering a 5 month payback and annual energy and labour savings of greater than \$15,000.
